## **Good Mews Celebrates 10,000 Spay/Neuter Surgeries**

Marietta, GA – Good Mews Animal Foundation is proud to announce that they have performed 10,000 spay and neuter surgeries as part of their ongoing efforts to reduce pet overpopulation and promote responsible pet ownership.

Good Mews, a non-profit organization dedicated to providing quality care for homeless, abused and abandoned cats, has been at the forefront of the spay and neuter movement since the induction of the on-site Misty Williamson Surgical Suite in 2018. The foundation's mission is to reduce the number of unwanted cats and kittens in the community through spaying and neutering, and to provide a safe haven for homeless cats until they can be placed in loving homes through adoption.

"We are thrilled to reach this milestone and grateful for the ongoing support of our community," said Good Mews President, Elizabeth Finch. "Our spay and neuter program, along with our Community Cat Program, has had a tremendous impact on reducing pet overpopulation and improving the lives of cats in our community."

Good Mews is committed to providing affordable spay and neuter services to pet owners and rescues, and has been able to provide these services at low-to-no cost to families within the greater Atlanta area, through its partnership with local animal rescue organizations and the organization's community cat program. The foundation has also educated thousands of pet owners on the importance of spaying and neutering their pets.

"Spaying and neutering is a simple and effective way to control pet overpopulation, reduce the number of cats and kittens in shelters, and improve the overall health and well-being of our feline friends," said Finch.

Good Mews is proud to have made a positive impact on the lives of so many cats and the communities in which they live. The foundation will continue to work tirelessly to promote responsible pet ownership and reduce pet overpopulation through its spay and neuter program.

Since 1988, Good Mews has placed over 11,000 cats in permanent homes. Good Mews receives no government support, relying solely on donations of time, service, and money from generous supporters, the public, and area businesses. The organization's shelter is home to approximately 100 residents at any given time, with another 30 to 40 cats in foster care or the organization's HALO program. In addition to life-saving spay and neuter surgeries, the organization has an average adoption rate of 600 cats per year.
